Which core subject is the most important?

If there is anything extremely easy to scrutinize, it is the methods of the public school system. A common criticism many kids rehash when referring to their classes is "when am I ever gonna need to know this?", which, when argued intelligently can be a fair point. When it comes to the four core subjects, English, math, history, and science, what is truly necessary? How is importance defined by students? Is an area of study important because of its foundational effects on how the world functions as a whole, or is it important because of its applicability in their individual everyday life and preferred career?

From a survey sent to the juniors with 30 responses, the most important subject has English prevailing at 43%, followed by math at 37%, history at 13%, and science at 7%. On the contrary, when asked to vote for the least important subject, science comes in at 30%, history at 27%, English at 23%, and math at 20%. Based on the data as a whole, the juniors generally define importance as anything pertaining to succeeding financially and in the workforce. Some students who favored math wrote, "Math is not my absolute favorite but I think it is very necessary to have a background in mathematics to understand things like taxes, buying a home, buying a car, etc." Others said "Many more careers involve knowing basic and/or advanced math skills than other core subjects." There is more of a focus on how these subjects benefit them individually than how they shape the world unlike the rare science enjoyers who said "Everything is science!"

Those who chose English had similar ideas to those who chose math. "English is used in every career path, whether you use it in the career or to get in," but unlike math, English people also placed emphasis on gaining respect and being socially competent. "English is the most important because if you cannot convey your idea properly, you lose the respect of the person who is listening/reading anything you say or write." I cannot argue back with the English points because I also agree that it is one of the most important subjects to success, but when it comes to math, I would argue that only basic math is necessary to be fine financially, and it can all be done on a calculator (which are built into our phones, so we always have calculators with us). Still, I can see the argument for math, which cannot be said about the arguments denoting the other two subjects as least important.

So what about the other two subjects that got the shorter end of the stick? Science was voted least important, largely due to its perceived specificity and lack of practical use. "The only need for science is when you want to go into a science field," but I would argue that in the midst of a two year long pandemic that does not seem to be slowing down, lack of scientific awareness (especially in our country) has only been stunting our progress.

Additionally, history seems to be low on many kids' priority lists which I personally disagree the most with. A student said, "Most careers you do not need to know anything that happened in the past." Many kids hear "those who do not learn history are doomed to repeat it," which, while having some weight, loses them right off the bat because it does not provide the whole picture as to why history is important. Being a contributing citizen does not boil down to just one's performance in their job, but through their vote as well! As Americans we live in a democracy, which is a system that is only as strong as its people are educated. Take away that education on our history and government and what forms is a disastrous political wasteland of people who have no idea what they are talking about. "Either we make the voting regulations more strict to prevent stupid decisions or we educate the masses better to make the public choice more meaningful and wise" said another student. History is also largely based on interpretations and forming logical arguments, which can definitely help the current generation of upcoming voters who have been inhibited by family or internet echo chambers. That tangent aside, it is important to be aware of what you think you will need most in the future in order to appropriately divide your time and effort while you are still a student.
