
Some of Sasha's accomplishments include her getting player of the game during a soccer game. Sasha says that she would consider doing sports in her future if it gets to that point.




The pep rally will be Thursday October 5, during period 7 and going into flex.

The AP exams can be very beneficial to students and allow them to broaden their horizons academically. For students who are comfortable test takers, the exam offers college credit while you are still in high school, and that can benefit students in the longer term." College credits can support student's academic abilities and boost their chances of future schooling. While the tests sound difficult, the preparation and practice before the testing helps in the long run. Mrs Texter shared, "I like students to know exactly what to expect and then practice so they feel comfortable when they have to face the exam." To give students a better understanding of what to expect, Mrs. Texter gives her students examples of prompts and helps them discover how to properly write detailed essays that will hopefully help students receive good scores.

Some students shared their opinions on the exam. Shelby Dougherty, junior, is a student in the AP Language and Composition class. She shared, "I would like to take the exam in order to fully take advantage of the opportunity to obtain college credits while in high school." The results of the exam could allow students to gain college credits and have the ability to show future colleges their capabilities and strengths. With the students confidence comes some worry.

Amelia Gassert, junior, is also a student in the AP Language and Composition class. She stated, "I think the most challenging part would be having to write each essay in only 40 minutes. Not even the content is that difficult, it is being able to handwrite everything you want to talk about in a timely manner." Students are only given 2 hours to complete the 3 essays on the exam, testing their quick thinking abilities.

The test will be held on May 14 at 8 am. While the exam might not be for everyone, it is a very good opportunity for those hoping to advance in the English field and continue academics after high school.

Band marches forward

The marching band spends a couple weeks before the start of school to prepare for basics and for the ability to build stamina, in which they call band camp. To choose the music the marching band plays, Mrs. Kline and several other staff members pick a theme for the show tunes, like the current one called 'Favorite flashbacks.' The original theme for this year was Micheal Jackson's top hits like Dirty Diana, Thriller, and Beat it, but Dirty Diana was out of availability and the group already does Thriller for parades. This is Mrs. Kline's eleventh year doing band camp at Hamburg, and she loves to watch the group's growth over the week and a half they spend together, as well as the bonds they have created.
