

Then she went on to raptors and why Hawk Mountain is a key part to their migrating path. Many raptors try to conserve the most energy they can while migrating, so they use updrafts and thermals. Hawk Mountain has a valley between the two mountains, which creates a spot where the raptors can find the updrafts and thermals to move along their migratory trail. Erin brought out a Red-Tailed Hawk that had been hit by a car and could not return to the

the first stop South Lookout. There Erin pointed out the peaks of the distance mountains, so they could spot the raptors that could fly through that day. Erin had her helper show the students how to use a Kestrel, which is a small handheld weather device. The device can measure wind speed, wind direction, and temperature.

The students then went up to the North Lookout. There they ate their packed lunches, while they observed the sky. A caller was sitting up on the rocks, calling out birds as they passed through the valley. The students were fortunate enough to see several Turkey Vultures as well as two Sharp-Shinned Hawks. After about 45 minutes, the students hiked back down.

Near the beginning, the students got to go into the Native Plant Garden and learn a bit about the native species.

It was a great experience for the students and every one of them had a wonderful time. Mrs. Bucheit declared, "It went well. Even though we didn't get to see many birds moving through, the weather was nice and there were some birds. I had fun and I hope the students did too." There was plenty to see and hear, and the students learned a lot about migrating raptors.




Students hear Bob Lenz speak about Dignity Revolution

Every year, in the fall, a group of volunteer students dedicate their time to helping maneuver the wheelchairs of the residents for the fall Carnival. Hamburg has been doing this for many years, however this will be the last year that our high school students get to help because the center is closing within the year. When the students go to the center, they are given a five minute crash course on the specialized wheelchairs and then they are escorted to the rooms to get the residents. From here, the students are paired up with a person who they will guide around for the afternoon. The students push the residents around to different carnival games and help them participate in them.

The theme for this year's carnival was Luau with Hawaiian decorations and themed shirts. The game that the residents were able to participate in included; bowling, hacky sack sling, plinko, and using a parachute to make the balls and balloons bounce off of it. There is always a clown named Splash who comes in and makes balloon animals for the residents and then they get there picture taken. The reason all these games are done by the residents is because the staff is trying to encourage them to use their hands and motor skills

Brea Borrel says, "It's really refreshing being able to help out people who cannot help themselves. It makes you realize all the privileges in life that you have."

The Hamburg Center has been up and running since 1960 as a tuberculosis center. It slowly transformed into a "licensed intermediate care facility for people with intellectual disabilities." The center houses around 120 people who receive a wide variety of different services. The Hamburg Center is 278 acres with 39 buildings, however 145 acres are leased to farmers that neighbor the property. The Hamburg Center will be closing because Governor Wolf's "administration's commitment to serve more people in the community, reduce reliance on institutional care, and improve access to home and community services."

Hawk Mountain Sanctuary is a scientific research center that started in 1938 by Rosalie Edge who leased the land and then ended up purchasing it. Hawk Mountain is a non-profit organization. It is also one of the best places in northeastern North America to view the annual autumn hawk migration.

On Monday Mrs. Heffner from BCTC came to our school to talk to the class of 2021 about BCTC and what it offers for us as students. BCTC stands for Berks Career & Technology Center. There are two buildings for BCTC, an east and west building. East is the Oley building and west is the Leesport building. At BCTC there are 22 different classes students can take. They are Advertising art and design, Auto Collision, Auto Technology, Business Management Entrepreneurship, Communication Media, Cosmetology, Drafting, Culinary, Early Childhood Education, Electrical, Electronic Technology, Graphing Imaging, Health Occupations, IT Programing, Mechatronics, Painting & Technology, Precision Machining, REC & Power, Robotics, Welding Technology, and Faculty/ Staff.

Although BCTC is not for everyone, some benefits that come with attending BCTC are that the student could potentially get a job right out of high school with the certifications they can earn. They can also get college class credits while attending some of the higher level classes there. If they chose to attend BCTC they will attend regular high school for one half of the day, get the required classes and then go on a bus to BCTC and attend there for the rest of the day practicing the trade of choice.

Depending on what they want to do when they get out of high school there are still options for them if they go to BCTC. There are 4 or 5 pathways you could choose. College, is one the first choice. At BCTC 40% of the students decide to go to college after high school. Then there is the military; militaries need all different types of positions, not just people fighting for us; they need people like nurses, doctors, technicians, engineers, electricians, and more. Another route is employment, they would go right out and get a job and start working right away and earning a paycheck. Then they could go on an apprenticeship, which is basically going and shadowing someone in the line of work that they'd like to be put into. Then they go and learn the tips, tricks, and what they need to know to go out and do the job on their own. If they would choose any of these things they will always have multiple options for your future.

One of the largest faults in society is its close-mindedness towards mental health and mental disorders. In addition bipolar disorder is one of the most misunderstood and misjudged disorders. Bipolar disorder is often times thought to mean mood swings, but it is really a brain disorder that causes unusual shifts in mood, energy, activity levels, and the ability to carry out day-to-day tasks. Typically people living with a bipolar disorder experience depressive episodes, which are different for everyone but usually the same symptoms as depression, and




manic episodes, which are also different for everyone but are characterized as very elated or energetic. Bipolar disorder is also thought to be rare and easily recognizable but 5.7 million adults in America live normal lives with some form of a bipolar disorder with the help of medication or therapy.

Everyone with bipolar disorder has different experiences, and their symptoms can show themselves in different ways but they can all be divided into one of the four different types of bipolar disorder. The different types are characterized by the amount of time between manic and depressive episodes and how long the episodes last.

People living with a bipolar disorder are not "crazy" or "out of control," they just experience emotions differently from other people. In fact, many of the emotions that bipolar disorder brings on are emotions that many other people feel from time to time. Manic episodes tend to make people feel jumpy, abnormally talkative, or like their thoughts are moving too fast. On the other hand, depressive episodes make people feel sad, worried, and can cause issues with concentration. None of these symptoms are exclusive to just bipolar disorders, therefore they are not as weird or obscure as most people think. Fortunately there are many different treatments for bipolar disorders and most people with it can live their lives normally with minimal symptoms.


has the amount of work of an AP level course causing someone to use and know the content that was taught in class.
