



Another teacher in Hamburg Area High School who also speaks another language is Mr. Hetrich. The program she would most probably use is Rosetta Stone.

There were three teachers that taught Mrs. Herman Spanish, but she only remembers two: Sister Marita de Lourdes and Mrs. Heffelfinger. The only apps to communicate with speaking users who speak another language are translation apps. For deaf people, they either have to lip read, write, text, or sign to others.



In an effort to assert control over her school decisions, Jenna drops all of her AP classes. When her childhood best friend and crush, Julian moves back to town, he ends up in Jenna's English class. Noticing that he was struggling with school, Jenna reaches out to him anonymously to help. Their relationship soon develops into something more than friendship, however, Jenna is plagued by doubt. 
1989 Album review
